THE PROPERTY

A 110sq m, threebedroom traditional Dutch dyke house in Abcoude, the Netherlands, built in 1900.

66 I love waking up to the sun shining on the white walls – our house has such a pure and warm feeling 99

eltje Janmaat remembers, 'I discovered this house five years ago, when I went for a jog along the Angstel River in Abcoude. At the time, Erik and I were living in a tiny place, which had crooked walls and lots of narrow stairs – unique but not practical, especially as at that time we were hoping to start a family, so this place caught my attention.'

Jeltje and Erik's names joined more than 20 others on the estate agent's list, but gradually other potential buyers dropped out, daunted by the poor condition of the house and restrictions on increasing its size. 'We decided to extend into the garage adjoining the house to create a ground-floor bedroom for us, keeping the upstairs rooms under the eaves free for the children (Steffi arrived 18 months after the couple bought the house; Sylvie a year later). 'We took out all the internal walls and floors ourselves, so only the exterior walls and roof remained in place. Fortunately, we had a good builder who helped us realise our vision.'

The aim was to introduce a sense of light and space to the traditional house. As well as the bedroom downstairs, there's an open-plan kitchen-diner and sitting room, with a bathroom between helping to define the two areas. A glazed extension wraps around the front and corner of the house, connecting the living area with the garden, while patio doors do the same job in the couple's bedroom. Jeltje's chosen different white and creamy tones for the furnishings and even the plywood kitchen made by the builder is whitewashed. 'It makes everything come together and now even the wood has a beautiful soft look,' Jeltje says. 'By using warm fabrics and materials such as linen and wood, our house feels light and welcoming.'











Give kids their own space

A corner of the living area is a dedicated play space for the children. Jeltje had a carpenter make this low bench, and added cushions for comfortable story times.

Make the kitchen blend in

The kitchen is part of the open-plan living space, but doesn't dominate it. The units were made from plywood by the builder, then whitewashed by Jeltje. The design is deliberately minimal. 'We have open shelves for storage rather than

filling the walls with cabinets. It stops the space looking claustrophobic,' she says.







As brand director for Joules, it's no wonder that Chloe Ward's home is as colourful and characterful as the company's signature bold and bright prints

attern queen Chloe joined the company as a designer in 2003 and now oversees the in-house print team's designs across fashion, homeware and accessories. She lives in Norfolk with her husband Jolly and their three sons, Felix, seven, Monty, five and Rufus, two, and their dog, Tuna.

It took a year to renovate our

house. It's a farmhouse we bought two years ago. We took the roof off and redid it, got a new boiler, tiling, lighting, flooring... and then all the painting and decorating. It helps that Jolly is a builder who specialises in renovating old buildings!

I don't like a house to be decorated inside like a big white

box. I love colour and we have loads of it throughout the house. One of my favourite rooms is our bathroom – it's painted in a really dark navy colour called Hague Blue from Farrow & Ball and the floor tiles are a gorgeous graphic tile from Fired Earth called Trellis Lattice. The dark colours and bold print look really striking against our white roll-top bath and brass taps.

We buy a lot of furniture at

auctions. If you get into auction buying, as opposed to investing in antiques, you can get some really







WHAT I'VE LEARNED

66 Whenever I've made really rubbish decorating decisions,

it's because I've rushed something. I've learned to take my time now and plan things before picking up a paintbrush! 99 great pieces while keeping your costs fairly low. I love our kitchen table, partly because it's so gorgeous, but also because we made it our own. When we brought it home from the auction, we stripped all the varnish off and painted the legs in a dark grey, almost black shade called Down Pipe from Farrow & Ball. In total, for the table, the paint and materials, the whole thing cost us just £250.

It's nice to mix all the old stuff with new pieces though. I prefer to live somewhere that's full of character, so we've furnished our house with antique pieces that we got from auctions as well as contemporary furniture and accessories that we bought new.

Our garden is quite traditional, with box hedging and topiary.

Because we have three boys, we spend a lot of time in it! It has an original Georgian greenhouse that we've painstakingly restored. It's a great thing to have – particularly during the summer when evenings draw in and it gets quite chilly. It basically spends the whole day heating up in the sunshine, so we retreat into it when the sun goes down. It's nice and cosy, yet you still feel like you're outside enjoying the garden. We have friends over and hold discos in there for the boys.

We go to the beach a lot, too.

We often take a picnic to Holkham Beach late in the day at teatime, when everybody else is leaving and there's just a smattering of people left. Picnics are a bit of a faff to organise, but it's such a lovely thing to do with the family that it's totally worth the hassle in the end. I love our Joules picnic baskets and there's a really good range of melamine, too - practical and good looking, but also childproof.

I think that's what's so special about Joules as a brand - it's about the countryside and enjoying the outdoors, taking time out to enjoy nature and spending time with your family.










ona and Gordon Drysdale's home is built on the site of a fisherman's net store that had been in Iona's family for years. 'My uncle bought it from the local estate, intending to turn it into a house,' she says. 'He got as far as clearing and levelling the site when he fell ill and asked me if I'd like to take it on.'

At the time Iona was working as a doctor in New Zealand and had no plans to return to Scotland in the foreseeable future. 'However, when I realised how unwell my uncle was, I came back for six months to hang out with him,' she says. 'I really enjoyed being home, so I decided to relocate to London before coming back here.

'I wasn't sure what form the house was going to take, but I had seen a picture of a house with a glass gable end and thought that might work really well here,' she says. 'I drew some sketches with my uncle and hired a local draughtsman, Robin Phillips, to draw up plans.

'I applied for planning permission in 2012 and the house was finished by the beginning of 2014. My cousin, Cameron Hay, is a joiner and built the house,' says Iona. 'I co-ordinated the project from London and came up every four to six weeks. It didn't totally go to plan: it's a very long, narrow site and the original building was constructed against the rock behind it. This had to be broken away to fit the foundations of the new house and added to the cost of the ground works.

'The house has changed our lives. When you've grown up here, you don't realise how special it is, but now I've been away, I appreciate it. Moving here prompted us to start a yacht charter business and we've just finished renovating a nearby croft. Our first baby's on the way, so after the birth we'll move into the croft and rent out this house as a holiday let (the-net-store.com).













Go big on storage

Keen to create a calm, minimalist feel and beat clutter, the couple planned storage to the max. The bespoke kitchen units use every inch of space and the built-ins continue along the passageway to the main bedroom.

66 We love the calm atmosphere we've created here. It's minimal, but warm and cosy, too 99

en and Rachelle Garnham bought this flat in 2013 and it's their first home together as a couple. They loved the fact that, unusually for Scottish tenements, the attic was also incorporated into the property. 'We liked the dual character of the building – the spacious, high-ceilinged living areas downstairs and the cosier, sloping design in the bedrooms upstairs,' says Rachelle.

The flat had been renovated, but cheaply, and the decor was bland. 'The walls were all painted magnolia and the oatmeal carpets were looking tatty and tired,' says Rachelle. Having stretched their budget to the limit to buy the flat, the couple have developed a style that looks high end, but didn't cost the earth to create. Throughout the flat, they've stuck to a stripped-back, simple look but added a top layer of luxury with natural materials and glamorous touches of gold.

They didn't get the look right first time, though. 'We decorated quite a few of the rooms straightaway, using mainly grey with silver touches,' says Rachelle. 'Then we slowed down when it came to the kitchen and bathroom and realised that the rooms we'd completed earlier were not quite right, so we had to redo them.' After coming up with a blush, grey and gold scheme for their wedding, they decided to roll out the idea at home, too, and they've stuck to it ever since. 'Our friends laugh at our commitment to our colour palette, but they still adore our home and we love having visitors, so it's a win-win situation,' she adds.

The couple enjoyed the process so much, they're even thinking of doing it all over again: 'We love a project, so it's tempting to think of moving – especially because we really want a garden!' says Rachelle.











Get the details right

Great lighting gives the simple kitchen a lift. 'With a minimal look, you rely on details to create impact,' says Ben. 'Our vision was to give this space an industrial feel, like you'd find in a café or restaurant, with open shelving to make everything accessible,' adds Rachelle.

ooking around Nicola Law's elegant home, it's unrecognisable from the higgledy-piggledy property she bought 10 years ago. 'The house was divided up into flats when we moved in and hadn't been decorated since the Seventies,' she explains. 'I wanted to return it to a single family home, and reinstate the period features.'

This house is positioned on a sunny street just moments from the Hove seafront. 'Our road is filled with similar Regency houses, and they are all beautifully kept with painted fronts and black iron railings. I wanted to care for this house the same way, and to decorate it to make the most of the high ceilings, cornicing and sash windows,' she says.

Nicola started by uncovering the original staircase, which had been boxed in by the previous owners. Wooden floorboards have been sanded and waxed, sash windows painted a fresh white and boarded-up fireplaces have been revealed and restored.

As an avid antiques and vintage collector, Nicola will travel far and wide to hunt out unusual items. 'My weekends are spent driving to different vintage fairs. Lots of the more quirky pieces we own, like the wooden shutters and green bell vases, were found in France.' She also finds hidden gems locally at antiques markets in Lewes, Arundel, Ardingly and Brighton.

Resisting the temptation to restore her finds, Nicola prefers to let them be. Armchairs with insides exposed or worn wooden cupboards are left as she found them. 'My intention was always to reupholster the living room armchairs but their lived-in look is so cosy and relaxed, so I simply covered them with vintage French linens instead. My home reflects the places from my travels that I have fallen in love with.'

Add 'original' features

While the kitchen units are super-simple, Nicola made sure the space has lots of character by laying reclaimed-wood flooring and fitting sash windows with traditional folding shutters.

Connect with colour

To showcase her diverse collection of antique pieces, Nicola has painted every room in milky shades. 'I've stuck with similar colours that are chalky, rustic and earthy,' she says. 'It's inspired by family holidays to the Mediterranean where homes are decorated in simple tones.'

Work around a hero piece

In Nicola's bedroom, she's kept the scheme calm so that her Victorian decoupage screen can stand out. She's been careful to add texture, though, with velvet cushions and a vintage bedspread. 'I pick up antique linens whenever I see them because I love the quality so much,' she says.

Mix your flooring

Wooden flooring from the hall runs into this bathroom then segues into rustic cobbled tiles. 'I spotted the idea in a bar in Lisbon's Old Town,' says Nicola. 'I love the way the Portuguese use tiles on every surface and took my inspiration from there.'

BUY THE KEY PIECES

For similar wall tiles try Antalya Crema limestone tiles, £75.94sq m; and for flooring try Antalya Crema Bevel tiles, £153sq m, both Topps Tiles







Keep the backdrop basic

With characterful furniture demanding attention, Nicola doesn't let walls or flooring work too hard. 'In the guest room, I just replaced the damaged flooring with cheap floorboards, which I painted,' says Nicola.

Invest in go-anywhere pieces

Nicola is careful to buy antique and vintage pieces that can be moved around to give rooms a fresh look. The wooden trunk in her bedroom is great as a linen chest, but would look equally good holding shoes in the hallway, and the ornate mirror can simply be propped in any corner that needs light.



Design writer Claudia Baillie styles her perfect bedroom using Hillarys roller blinds as the starting point





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HOW MARIA DID IT

'My previous home had a large kitchen-diner and I wanted to recreate that family space here, but it was too small and in need of a lot of work – the Fifties units were falling apart and the polystyrene-tiled ceiling was starting to collapse. I decided to get a builder to knock down the old conservatory to make room for a modern extension, which added valuable space. Luckily I didn't need planning permission, because I didn't

build beyond the original footprint of the house, so it was fairly straightforward. I wanted to keep the space feeling open and uncluttered, so I chose timeless Shaker cabinetry and simple furnishings in neutral tones. All together the project took six months to complete and the design and installation cost £2,700. It's exactly what I wanted – an inviting place to spend time with my family.'

HOW JEN AND MILES DID IT

BEFORE

'We decided to knock our kitchen and dining room together and extend out as well. Our builders were Cheshire Sustainable Construction, who we'd used before. I was after a traditional kitchen and my 'must-haves' were solid-looking units, lots of storage and a range (we'd had one before and I love the warmth!). Quotes for bespoke units were too high, but then I spotted my perfect kitchen in *Ideal Home*! It was within budget, looked perfect and the supplier was a local firm, Lloyds Kitchens and Bedrooms. HOW LISA AND GERRY DID IT

'The old bathroom was put in when the house was built in the Nineties and it had become tired and dated. It had glossy coral-coloured tiles and a fitted bath with a dark-wood panel. We spent some time doing research, then went to a local company, Hawk Kitchens & Bathrooms, to discuss our ideas. They arranged a site visit by their designer. We already had an en-suite shower room, so decided to just have

a bath in here. We updated the en suite and downstairs cloakroom at the same time, which involved reconfiguring the plumbing. It had to be done in stages, so we were never without a loo. We kept the bath in the same place, but knocked out the archway to make the alcove more light and open. The work and installation (including underfloor heating and electrics) cost £7,000 and took around four weeks.'

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Make it work for you

LISA'S CHOICE: EXPOSED BRICK

Impressed by the rustic charm of Lisa's walls? Consider stripping back to bare brickwork to reveal instant character

Brick slip wall tiles like Lisa's are a fast, stylish alternative to the real thing, but if original exposed brickwork is what you're after, whether modern industrial or rustic country, be prepared to put in some hard graft to get the best results.

Which wall should I expose? Exposed brick is a pretty bold statement, so try not to get carried away. Stick to one wall or a section of wall with natural start and finish points, such as a chimney breast or inside alcoves.

Can I do the work myself? Absolutely. Drill a test hole in the plaster to check the brickwork is worth stripping. If it's damaged or the colour isn't your bag, refill the hole. Prepare for serious dirt and dust. Cover surfaces and seal doors. Work across the wall from left to right, hammering and then gently lifting the plasterwork off with a trowel or putty knife.

How can I tidy the bricks up? First, remove loose cement or brickwork with a stiff brush, not wire, then vacuum. 'If the removed cement leaves cavities, repoint gaps to avoid drafts or an attack of creepy-crawlies,' says DIY interiors vlogger Georgina Burnett (thehomegenie.com). 'Make new

cement look less obvious by dabbing on watered-down chalk paint.'

Will the bricks need sealing? Sealing will alter the colour of the brickwork, which can ruin the original look. 'And once it's done, it's impossible to reverse,' adds period property expert Roger Hunt. In some cases, sealing can trap moisture inside the brick, which could cause problems. However, in moisture-prone rooms like kitchens and bathrooms, PVA or terracotta sealant is recommended to protect the bricks and improve hygiene.

What if I don't have original brickwork to expose?

Brick slips could be the answer – try Eurobrick Systems or Matclad. Also called veneer bricks, they mimic a solid wall but are thinner. Another solution is to build a new wall using reclaimed bricks for character, but you will lose living space and require a bricklayer.

Emulate real brickwork with a brick slip tiled feature wall




HOW JO DID IT

'The bathroom was originally downstairs and far too cramped for three growing children, my husband and me. Frankly, it was horrible. It didn't have a separate shower and it was such a pain going downstairs at night to use it. We got planning permission for a two-storey rear and side extension, which meant we could finally tackle it. We decided to use some of the new space, as well as part of one of the larger bedrooms. aren Howden and her husband Tom Gandey knew that flat-hunting in London usually involves compromise, but, for them, a garden was a priority. 'We'd been living in Canada and really enjoyed entertaining and relaxing in our garden there,' says Karen. 'We wanted outdoor space here, even if it was tiny.'

The couple found a raised ground floor flat, which has this garden accessed by steps from a balcony off the living room. It didn't look promising – a mossy lawn edged with shrubs and overshadowed by trees. But the couple were prepared to strip it all out and start again to turn it into a multifunctional extra living space. 'We needed it to be

low maintenance and were keen to have a water feature for the lovely sound.'

A local landscaping company, Belsize Gardens, cleared the space and removed most of the trees to let in light. Its designer also helped them to plan a paved garden, broken up with clusters of plants that would add height and texture but require little attention.

Karen kept things simple, focusing on interesting foliage and white flowers, but with mixed success. The hydrangeas were a hit and now form the backbone of the planting scheme, but the hostas fell victim to slugs. The bulk of the work was done over a couple of months and, since then, everything has matured to turn the space into a sheltered oasis.

Extra living space

Weathered brick walls and an old cherry tree were integrated into the design, instantly lending the garden an established feel. The garden studio extends the couple's living area, as it's furnished with comfortable seating and a wine fridge.

The seating area has comfy teak loungers and a rustic bench that doubles as log storage for the fire pit. 'We wanted to sit outdoors for as long as possible on summer evenings,' says Karen. Ivy will quickly cover the surrounding fences, turning this into a calm, green retreat.

Dining corner

A living wall makes a soft, green backdrop for the dining area. 'We saw the idea online and thought it looked really attractive, lively and fabulous for creating privacy,' says Karen. 'Ferns, grasses and periwinkles flourish there, and any gaps that appear are easy to fill with annuals, too.'







Clever planting

In a mostly green garden, low-effort grasses make a contrast with leafier plants. They bring height, texture and movement and their pretty seedheads add extra softness to the hard landscaping.

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
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TECH SUPPORTBOOST YOUR HOME WI-FI

Good broadband is considered as important now as the other utilities. Smartphones, televisions, tablets, computers, even washing machines now rely on a strong wireless signal, so follow this advice to boost performance to every corner of your home...

QI pay a lot for a fast broadband service but I still have a weak signal, why?

Broadband speed and wi-fi strength are different things and some simple tweaks could make a huge difference. Charles Reed, smart home expert at Maplin suggests, 'Don't hide the router behind furniture. Instead, fit a longer cable so you can put it in the middle of your home.'

Can putting the router on a table improve things?

Yes, but you can also improve your wireless broadband by plugging in more devices. TVs, games consoles and set-top boxes all have Ethernet cables, and if you plug them in, the demand on your wireless signal will reduce, improving its performance.

Will a new router make a difference? The best wi-fi standard is 802.11ac, so if your router is 802.11b or 802.11g, you may see an improvement with a new router.

Do we expect too much from our broadband speeds? 'Recent surveys have confirmed that broadband users paying for 8Mbs often only get speeds of 2-3Mbs,' explains Charles. 'This could be due to the distance you are from the telephone exchange, the number of devices using the wireless signal and the quality of cables running to your home. The latest fibre-optic services have a better signal than older, copper cables.'



Ideal Home Tip

Turn it off and on again! No really, it might sound obvious, but by regularly rebooting your router you can actually improve its performance and keep it working as efficiently as possible.

Are there settings on my router I can tinker with?

Most routers automatically pick a particular channel, but if your neighbour is on the same one, they could interfere with each other. Change the channel via your Broadband supplier's homepage.

What if I have fibre-optic broadband and a wellpositioned router but still suffer from patchy coverage?

Try a Powerline Extender plug - it uses your home's existing wiring

so you can effectively plug into the router using any socket. To improve wireless coverage, a plug-in wi-fi Range Extender, or a whole home wi-fi solution such as the Netgear Orbi (£355, Currys) will give your signal a healthy boost.

What about the smart home - will connected lights and appliances drain my wi-fi?

Use Ethernet cables to plug in as many of these devices as possible to reduce the strain on your wi-fi and achieve the most reliable connection.



- 3 Divide the veggie rice between four jars and top each with some tomatoes, mozzarella and avocado. Pour over the remaining oil and balsamic vinegar, and seal the jars. Shake well before serving.



Classic Scotch eggs

Takes 45min, plus cooling **Makes** 6

INGREDIENTS ● 450g sausagemeat ● ½ bunch spring onions ● Zest of 1 lemon ● Bunch fresh lemon thyme, leaves picked ● 7 eggs ● Flour, for dusting ● 75g breadcrumbs ● Vegetable oil, for frying

- 1 Combine the sausagemeat with the spring onions, lemon zest and lemon thyme leaves.
- 2 Hard boil 6 of the eggs, leave to cool then peel off the shells. Beat the remaining egg. Lightly coat the hard-boiled eggs in flour, dusting off the excess, then dip each one into the beaten egg. Wrap an equal amount of sausagemeat around each egg, rolling them in your hands to seal and smooth.
- **3** Roll each one in a little more flour, then dip into the beaten egg again. Finally, roll each egg in the breadcrumbs to completely cover the meat. Heat the oil in a deep-sided pan and fry the Scotch eggs in batches for around 10min, or until crisp and golden and cooked through.
- 4 Drain on kitchen paper and leave to cool.



Chicken & ale pie


Takes 4hr 15min, plus chilling **Serves** 12

INGREDIENTS • 150g lard, diced • 550g plain flour • 2tsp salt • 550g pork shoulder, diced • 1 shallot, chopped • 50g pistachios • 1tsp chopped rosemary • 450g chicken breasts, sliced • 1 egg, beaten • 3 sheets leaf gelatine • 150ml stock • 150ml ale

- I Preheat the oven to 200°C/Fan 180°C/Gas 6. Grease and line a deep 18cm cake tin. Melt the lard with 275ml water and bring to the boil. Stir in the flour and salt to make a pliable dough.
- **2** Roll out two thirds of the dough to a 32cm round. Press it into the tin. Line with greaseproof paper and half fill with baking beans; bake for 30min. Lift out the paper and beans. Bake for 10min.
- 3 Combine the pork, shallot, nuts and rosemary. Season. Fill the pie, alternating layers of chicken and pork. Roll out the leftover pastry to top the pie. Crimp the edges. Make a hole in the top. Brush with egg and bake for 30min. Reduce heat to 180°C/Fan 160°C/Gas 4. Bake for 1hr. Remove from the tin, brush with egg, bake for 30min.
- 4 Soak the gelatine for 5min, then stir it into the stock and ale. Cool and pour into the pie. Chill overnight.





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YOUR GUIDE TO...

Planning permission

Whether you want to convert, extend or build new, make sure you have permission first

The planning process can be daunting, but the good news is that there are a number of projects that can be built under Permitted Development (PD), without needing to apply for planning permission. Going down the PD route saves time, money and hassle, while adding value to your home.

EASY WAY TO EXTEND

While PD does allow you to make changes to your home without obtaining planning permission, you are required to adhere to guidelines relating to size and appearance.

There are still procedures to follow and regulations differ between England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland. Building Regulations need to be met and if you live in a conservation area, PD rights are likely to be more restricted, so check with your local authority. There are also different requirements for listed buildings. Visit planningportal.gov.uk for full details of what's allowed.

In general, provided your property hasn't been extended in the past, you can extend by fifty per cent of the total area of land around your house, but remember outbuildings and sheds count towards this percentage.

GROUND-FLOOR EXTENSIONS

A rear extension is an obvious way to add space and will often turn a cramped kitchen into a spacious, open-plan living area. For single-storey extensions, you can build up to 3m from the back of an attached house and 4m from a detached house, and in England a temporary change to PD guidelines mean this has doubled to 6m and 8m respectively until 30 May 2019. If you want to extend under the temporary changes, you'll have to go through the free neighbour consultation scheme to gain prior approval.

Side extensions can only be singlestorey up to 4m high and no more than half the width of the original house. Side returns might only add a few metres, but will transform an interior and have no impact on the size or layout of the garden.

There are additional rules for ground-floor extensions regarding height, eaves and proximity to the boundary, which can also be found on the government's planning portal.

WHAT ELSE CAN I BUILD?

Loft conversions are one of the most affordable additions. A local loft company will know what's permissible under PD, but as a guide it must not exceed 40 cubic metres for a terraced house or 50 cubic metres for a detached or semi-detached house. This gives scope for rear dormers to make space for a bedroom and en suite. Digging down

and converting an existing cellar or basement into a living space is possible under PD. It's an expensive and lengthy process, however, and you'll need a specialist company to excavate and make it waterproof.

Provided you don't alter the footprint, garage conversions fall under PD, as does building a garden room as a home office, art studio or teenagers' hangout. To remain within PD, outbuildings should be no taller than 2.5m if they are within 2m of the garden boundary. Usage is a further issue: outbuildings built under PD can't be used as self-contained accommodation, you'll need planning permission for this.

WHAT NEXT?

Apply for a Lawful Development Certificate, which proves work was permitted. If you decide to sell your property, buyers will want to see evidence that an extension or loft conversion was carried out legally.

PLANNING PERMISSION

For multi-storey projects or when the level of PD rights remaining on your property is not enough, you'll need to apply for planning consent. It can take up to eight weeks for the planning office to consider an application and a fee is payable.

Loft conversions with a balcony or where the roof space needs to be altered, will also require permission, as will stand alone garage conversions and basements where a light well is added. Your local authority may also have a specific policy regulating construction that you have to comply with.

PARTY WALL AGREEMENTS

If you're building up to the boundary wall or excavating near one, you'll need a Party Wall agreement as well as written consent from your neighbours. If they object, you'll need to employ a surveyor to oversee the process. Find one via the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors (rics.org).



EXPERT ADVICE

Jude Tugman, co-founder of Architect Your Home, shares her advice for navigating the planning application process

■ INVEST IN A PROFESSIONALLY-PRODUCED PLAN

Planners always respond better to professionallyproduced plans as they clearly show intentions and include all the relevant information.

■ DEALING WITH REFUSAL If your application is refused, you need to understand the reasoning behind it. If you only need to make a few minor changes, do so and then resubmit. If the reasons are substantial, you can either rethink your plans or go to appeal.

■ BUILDING REGULATIONS As well as planning permission, you will also have to ensure your build adheres to Building Regulations.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW WHEN...

Building an extension

A well designed addition has the potential to transform your home. We share all the know-how you need to plan a successful project

As well as boosting your home's floor space, an extension can help pave the way to a reconfigured layout that complements your lifestyle. A cleverly-conceived project also has the potential to add wow factor and increase your home's resale value. Here's everything you need to consider before getting started, including tips on design, budgeting and planning.

CREATE YOUR BRIEF

First you need to formulate a comprehensive design brief. 'The best way to start is by identifying your needs,' says Jelena Cousins, creative director at Cousins & Cousins (020 7482 4009, cousinsandcousins.com). 'For example, do you need a bigger kitchen or living space? A separate bedroom or a laundry room? Writing this down will help to identify what your priorities are.'

Once you've highlighted the key functions you want from your extension, the design process can begin. Remember to plan the extension around your unique requirements – don't fall into the trap of working around an idea you've seen on television if it doesn't reflect your day-to-day needs.

ENGAGE AN ARCHITECT

While it isn't essential to bring a professional on board, a designer's vision can be hugely beneficial. Their insight on positioning, orientation, structural systems and building materials can help in creating a stunning addition. Having an expert involved can also help when construction begins – particularly if you encounter any unforeseen issues.

Once your design concept is in the bag, it's worth touching base with neighbours. 'Keep them informed throughout the process,' says Jelena. 'If you need planning consent for the works, their support could be crucial for the scheme's success.'

MANAGE THE BUDGET

Keep a close eye on your budget throughout the project, from the design phase right up until completion, to avoid any nasty surprises. Start by allocating an available project fund for your architect to work with. If you let them know what your key goals are – a bespoke kitchen, for example – they'll be able to tweak other aspects of the scheme to bring it in on budget.

As a guide, you should set aside between £1,100 and £1,300 per sq m for small, single-storey schemes, and between £1,300 and £1,500 per sq m for two-storey extensions. Allow at least £2,500 per sq m for large scale projects or those featuring high-spec building materials. It's also a sensible idea to ringfence a 10% contingency fund to help minimise financial pitfalls, too.

NEED TO KNOW









APPLY FOR PLANNING PERMISSION

While many extension schemes can be achieved under Permitted Development rights, anything that's pushing the boundaries in terms of design is likely to require formal consent from your local authority; likewise if you live in a designated zone, such as a Conservation Area or Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

Working with an architect or professional planning consultant can increase your chances of success at this stage. They are aware of local planning policy and will be best placed to create a design based on a thorough understanding of the guidelines. It can also help to find relevant examples of similar extensions on your street, as these can serve as a precedent for your project.

CHOOSE A BUILDER

Once you have the green light to go ahead with the build, you can put your project out to tender. Try to source quotes from at least three contractors - going by word of mouth recommendations is often a smart way to find a reliable firm. Alternatively, if you're working with an architect, he or she might be able to recommend a company they have worked with before. Always ask to see examples of past projects or find out if you can talk to previous clients. Then the build can begin. Depending on the complexity of the project and the size of the structure, construction will usually take between three and six months. Use this time wisely by sourcing products for the internal fit-out and bear in mind that kitchen suites and bespoke joinery often come with a significant lead time.

CHANGING NEEDS

The family chose to build a singlestorey kitchen extension which would give them enough space to cook, eat, entertain and relax. 'Our daughter, Alex, enjoys baking, but we were all getting in each other's way and struggling to make the room work for us,' says Maria. 'The dining area wasn't visible from the kitchen, so we rarely used it and tended to eat at the small kitchen table instead.'

FAST WORK

Whitshaw Builders (whitshaw builders.co.uk) completed the work using brick and blockwork for the extension and structural steel to support the seven-metre-wide aluminium sliding doors.

YOUNG TALENT

But it was Alex, then 13, who designed the new kitchen space with the help of My Fathers Heart (myfathersheart.com). 'Alex plans to be an architect,' says Maria. 'She included a baking area with lifting doors on the cupboards above the baking space, so that they don't get in the way when open. Now we spend so much time together in the kitchen – exactly as we'd hoped to.'

Great glazing

Increase natural light and improve the energy efficiency of your home with stylish doors and windows

One of the biggest areas to consider when planning an extension or renovation is glazing. Your choice of windows and doors is crucial in determining the character, style and appearance of your home. While glazing is costlier than other building materials, it's an investment buy and will have a dramatic impact on your home.

FRAME MATERIALS

Timber, uPVC and aluminium are the most popular frame materials. The latest manufacturing techniques have made timber a stronger, more energy-efficient choice than others, but it can be expensive.

On the other hand, uPVC is generally lower in price and comes in coloured and wood-effect finishes (so it can emulate timber designs at a fraction of the cost), as well as white. Frames made from uPVC tend to be thicker than other materials, which may be a consideration for bifold doors if you want uninterrupted views.

Aluminium frames bring a sleek look to a façade and their durable construction makes them strong enough to hold large panes of glass. Pick a frame with a thermal break (or thermal barrier) to minimise heat loss between the inner and outer frame.

Crittall-style steel windows and doors are a smart choice and give extensions a stylish, architectural feel.

GLASS CHOICES

Contemporary extensions lean towards more glass and less frame, so installing energy-efficient glazing is essential. To comply with Building Regulations, windows, bifold and sliding doors must be double-glazed for high levels of efficiency. Triple glazing holds in more heat but is pricey and its weight means it's not always an option for large sliding doors.

HIGH PERFORMANCE

Specialised types of glass are available and worth considering for different situations. Self-cleaning glass is a good choice for rooflights and hard-to-reach windows. It features a special coating that reacts with sunlight to break down dirt, allowing rain to wash it away. For south-facing glazing, it's worth considering solar control glass to reduce glare or low-emissivity glass to help lock heat in during winter and out during summer.

STRUCTURAL GLAZING

Frameless glazing is an innovative structural material. Thick, strong glass is fixed to the building itself and becomes part of the extension's construction. The demands of structural glass are complex, so it's advisable to employ a specialist to ensure great design and correct fitting.

■ BUY THE MOST ENERGY EFFICIENT

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW WHEN...

Converting your loft

Need an extra room but don't want to sacrifice your garden? Build upwards and create more space at home with a well thought out loft conversion

Lofts don't get a lot of love. Stuffed with 'just in case' junk and things that haven't seen the light of day for 20-plus years, they are often ripe for renovation. Clear yours of its clutter and you can turn it into somewhere you can still store essentials while it becomes a functional, beautiful space in its own right.

CHECK YOUR LOFT'S SUITABILITY

Start by working out if your loft can be converted. Ideally it will be at least 2.2m at the highest point. If yours isn't, you may want to reassess, as although there isn't a minimum room height dictated by Building Regulations, there is for staircases and access. A workaround is to lower the ceiling in the room below – you'll have to fit a new floor in the loft as part of the conversion, so this isn't as drastic as it sounds.

LOOK AT ANY OBSTACLES

Is there a water tank or a chimney stack that might need to be moved? Finally, check your roof – does it have a steep pitch that limits height around the room and may require a dormer or roof redesign? The roof should be weatherproof and insulated – felt under the tiles is a good indicator that it is.

WORK OUT A BUDGET

Loft conversions can increase the value of your property by up to 20 per cent and be put to almost any purpose, such as a bedroom, en suite, office or playroom. 'Loft conversions can cost as little as £12,000 for smaller projects and £40,000 plus for bigger developments,' explains Jude Tugman, MD at Architect Your Home. 'They're at the cheaper end of developments, but it's still a big investment.' Prefab loft replacement conversions are another option but they're pricey, costing around £55,000

on average. But ways you can save include swapping a dormer (a window or door projection that's added onto the roof) for rooflights, which are more affordable and don't involve structural alteration.

CHOOSE A PROFESSIONAL

Once you're ready to start planning, find a professional. More complex projects may require the expertise of an architect, but a building engineer or chartered surveyor could be a better fit. Most building engineers can produce plans for a conversion as well as the structural calculations needed for the timber and steel components of the roof space. Ask friends and family for their recommendations, ask neighbours who have had their lofts converted recently or look online for a specialist conversion company that can handle the whole project.

GET THE RIGHT PERMISSIONS

Converting a loft rarely requires planning permission* unless you're raising the roofline or changing its structure, but it will need Building Regulations approval. This ensures that the structural strength of the new floor will be sufficient and that the room and roof will be stable, with safely designed stairs and sound insulation as well as safe electrics, plumbing and glazing, if applicable. A building control surveyor will visit to make sure the work meets regulations and then issue a completion certificate. If your house is semi-detached or terraced, your project is subject to Party Wall Act requirements - this means you'll need to notify neighbours, too.

PREPARE YOUR LOFT

A conversion is an opportunity for a good clear out but also to assess storage. You can add fitted furniture, cupboards and shelving in low areas, or add built-in wardrobes that fit the contours of your room. The next stage involves moving items, such as the water tank, checking the electrical wiring and rewiring where necessary, and fitting new insulated floor joists (so they'll support the extra weight) and pipework.

START CONVERTING

This is when dormers, windows and roof lights are installed, rafters are reinforced, the roof insulated and access created with a new staircase. Any partition walls can be built along with first fix plumbing and electrics (deciding where sockets and switches will be located) and extraction if the conversion includes a bathroom. Then radiators are fitted and decorating begins.







Extending up made our home calmer?

A modest three-bedroom terrace began to feel too cosy for this family of four, prompting Kerry Smith and Kevin Whiteman to convert their loft

erry Smith and Kevin Whiteman bought their Dulwich home 12 years ago. Reluctant to move for extra space, they opted to convert their loft into a bedroom for Finn, nine and Zeffie, six.

EXPERT ADVICE

After investing £1,500 in their initial design, the couple decided it wasn't quite right and sought advice from a new architect, Darren Oldfield, introduced to them by their builder Mike Piludu from Urban Space. 'It was hard to walk away from our first design,' says Kerry. 'But Darren's logic was flawless. He showed us why the bathroom had to move and we liked the idea of relocating it to the box room. He gave us a beautiful double-height stairwell and two landings as well.'

INSPIRED DESIGN

As a travel magazine editor, Kerry looked to some of the hotels she'd stayed in for inspiration. 'Our Victorian-style bathroom was inspired by New York's Marlton Hotel and the eaves storage by Rome's Villa Nocetta.'

TACKLING PROBLEMS

When the building work started, the project became fraught with difficulties as they discovered the walls and roof were out of square. 'We had to rebuild the front roof plane and fix up the chimneys, which meant increasing our mortgage to pay for the work. But now we know everything has been done to the house and we love the sense of space and the views up there. We're no longer trying to cram into a house we don't fit. It's a much calmer place to be.'

Working with tradespeople

Make your extension or conversion run as smoothly as possible by hiring the right professionals for the job

There are several routes you can go down when extending or converting your property depending on your budget, skills and time. Word of mouth is often the best indicator of quality tradesmen, so ask people in your local area who have done a similar project for recommendations.

HIRING PROFESSIONALS

It can pay to employ a professional with the know-how to add extra value to your home. Architects and designers will often visualise the space in a way you may not have thought of, due to over-familiarity. You can also employ an architect to manage the entire building process from planning to overseeing construction and arranging input from specialists.

Another option is to work with a company that designs and builds loft conversions, extensions and basements, who will take on the entire project from conception to completion so you don't have to worry about hiring individual tradesmen.

You can also design and oversee your project using a local builder or main contractor who will employ subcontractors and run the day-to-day build so you just have to deal with one firm rather than multiple companies. If you do go down

this route, it's essential that your builder understands what you want from the outset and has experience in the type of project you are after.

GOLDEN RULES

Be sure everything is agreed in writing and your contract includes a breakdown of costs, how long the project will take and if it includes VAT. Check for any caveats which might involve extra expense. Making decisions early on is key to saving money as it's much easier to make changes during the planning stage than during the build.

Set up a payment schedule for installments to be paid as parts of the project are completed and never hand over large sums of money up front, although up-front payment for materials is fair. Allow a contingency fund of at least 10 per cent for unforeseen circumstances.

USEFUL CONTACTS

Look to professional bodies such as RIBA (architecture.com) to search for an architect in your area or the Federation of Master Builders (fmb.org.uk) to find builders and tradesmen. HomeOwners Alliance (hoa.org.uk) can help you find a party wall surveyor and planning consultant.



EXPERT ADVICE

Paula Higgins, chief executive at HomeOwners Alliance gives us her tips for a successful project

■ ALWAYS GET THREE QUOTES

This will help you judge what's reasonable. A quotation is a definite price, whereas a verbal or written estimate isn't legally binding. Each time you speak to a builder, architect or designer about your project, you'll be better able to judge if they're up to the job.

■ GET CERTIFICATES FROM TRADESMEN

By far the easiest route to Building Regulations compliance for electrical, gas or plumbing work is to get a certificate from your tradesman. They'll need to be a member of the Competent Person Scheme, a government-run accreditation programme, to be able to supply it. Otherwise, you'll need to request it yourself from your local authority.

■ DON'T BE FOOLED BY LOW QUOTES

They're often given in order to secure the job, and then the company will introduce extra charges as work progresses or cut corners to make savings.





WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW WHEN...

Converting your garage

If you have a garage attached to your home, you can save both time and money by making that space work harder instead of building a brand new extension

Do you really need a garage? While they do provide storage space, garages are often one of the most under-used parts of the home. But converted into a living space – whether it's an office, playroom, utility room, bedroom, bathroom or home gym – it will add value to your property.

EVALUATE YOUR GARAGE

The size, shape and style of your garage will determine what you can do with it. If your garage is long and narrow, it may be best to knock through to extend an existing room. But if the shape makes it possible, it's usually better to keep it separate, as most garages are located away from the main living space, making it tricky to incorporate them without additional construction.

Next, work out where the garage will be accessed from within your home – an existing door from the hallway may not be the most practical option if it impacts on the new room, for example. It will also make a difference to costs whether your garage is a single-skin, lean-to structure or part of your house – the latter is usually better built so requires less upgrading.

Check if anything in the garage has to be accommodated, such as a boiler or electricity meter – these can usually be boxed in rather than moved, which is more costly. It's a good idea to check the garage's wiring, too – if the new room is being rewired for lights and sockets, you may need a separate consumer unit to prevent overloading your mains.

WORK OUT A BUDGET

The best conversions are the ones that look and feel like part of your home rather than a hasty addition, so it's worth investing in matching brickwork (to fill in the garage door) and good insulation – a cold, draughty room won't get much use. 'A lean-to garage

is just a thin-walled shed, and only slightly better made than one,' explains Jude Tugman, MD at Architect Your Home. 'Converting means upgrading the walls, roof and floor, so costs around £1,700sq m. If the garage is built into the house and already has internal walls and a functioning ceiling, things get easier, but there's still lighting, windows, plastering and decoration to consider, costing around £1,200sq m.' If it's a lean-to and in poor repair, you may find it more cost-effective to demolish and rebuild rather than upgrade.

CHOOSE A PROFESSIONAL

While using an architect for your conversion can mean a more creative result and is ideal if you're thinking of building on top, an architectural designer, structural engineer or specialist conversion company are also

good options, depending on your project's size. A builder should be able to carry out the conversion, but you can do some of it yourself if you're confident that your work will meet Building Regulations.

OBTAIN PERMISSION

Garage conversions rarely require Planning Permission. So long as the footprint and elevations stay the same, it's considered Permitted Development. However, if you're planning to make significant changes to the exterior or the conversion will increase the size of your home beyond what's allowed by Permitted Development, you may need to submit an application. If you're not sure, apply for a Lawful Development Certificate from your council.

The conversion will be subject to Building Regulations as it's a 'change of use', which means that the walls, windows, floor and roof need to be energy efficient, the building must be structurally sound and the electrics and plumbing have to be compliant (for example if you're adding radiators or a bathroom). A building control inspector will oversee these at different stages of the conversion. The Party Wall Act may also apply if your project affects a structure shared with another property.

START CONVERTING

After any structural alterations, the floor should be damp-proofed if required, the walls, floor and roof insulated, and underfloor heating added. Next, windows and doors (bifold glass doors are a great way to fill the void left by a garage door) and first fix wiring and plumbing can be installed. You can then plaster, lay the floor, add lighting and finally, decorate the room.

Needing an extra bedroom and bathroom more than a double garage, Alicia and Leon Manco created this new space on a tight budget

licia and Leon Manco bought their home knowing it had lots of potential, but would require some renovation.

MAKING PLANS

Having decided to knock through to create a large kitchen-diner at the back of the house, the couple decided to convert the garage at the same time. 'I'm from Malaysia originally,' says Alicia, 'so we have lots of people visiting us and they often stay for several weeks at a time. Leon uses one of the upstairs bedrooms as a study, and we liked the idea of having separate guest accommodation, so a garage conversion seemed ideal.'

FIRST STEPS


'We found a great local builder, Dan Chownsmith of DC Carpentry and Construction (dccarpentryand construction.co.uk), who could do both jobs at once. The plans went through easily as we weren't changing the footprint, but Dan explained that it made sense to demolish and rebuild the garage to modern standards, instead of simply upgrading it.' As well as the guest bedroom and bathroom, Alicia and Leon also had space for a utility room to complement their new kitchen-diner. The project took four months to complete.

FINAL TOUCHES

They already had the furniture for the guest room from their previous house, but added some special touches to make the space feel extra inviting and cosy – such as the knitted throw and woodland scene canvas. 'We've made it look so lovely, I'm almost jealous!'





WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW WHEN...

Converting a basement

Extending underground is a fantastic way to add heaps of space to your property and increase its value.

We take a closer look at what's involved

Digging down can provide an excellent solution to create more space in your home, particularly if you live in an urban area where land values are high and you don't want to sacrifice part of your garden. However, integrating ventilation and natural light is a lot trickier when you're going underground – not to mention more expensive. That's why clever design and careful planning are both essential. Here's how to get it right.

FORMULATE YOUR BRIEF

The first stage of the basement extension process is to create your design brief. This should address what you intend to use the space for and the overall aesthetic you'd like to create. 'Without careful planning, it would be easy to end up with a large, poorly-lit zone with limited uses,' says Richard Gill, an associate at Paul Archer Design (paularcherdesign.co.uk). Given the great expense associated with subterranean projects, where the lion's share of the budget will go on excavation and underpinning, it pays dividends to establish an inviting space that adds real value to your home.

SEEK EXPERTISE

The key to establishing a light-filled, airy zone often involves hiring a professional to formulate the design concept. While many basement construction firms offer their own in-house design services, employing a recommended designer could make the difference between an efficient basement and a spectacular one. 'Engaging an architect shifts the focus to the creation of beautiful spaces,' says Richard. 'They will be able to address issues such as how to connect the basement with the main house and how to maximise natural light, while making it aesthetically pleasing, too.'

CONSIDER THE PRACTICALITIES

There's a raft of design and construction essentials to think about before submitting your planning application. For example, bear in mind that a fire escape strategy will need to be factored into the plans. 'Soil conditions and the water table also need to be properly investigated prior to any detailed design taking place. A clear waterproofing strategy has to be implemented,' says Siobhan Maguire, associate director at Paul Archer Design. If your priority is to create a bright, airy space, think carefully about how this will be achieved. 'Don't fall into the trap of skimping on floor-to-ceiling height,' says William McGuinness, director at UV Architects (uvarchitects.co.uk). 'You need to ensure a minimum height of 2.7m.'



INFORM YOUR NEIGHBOURS

It's wise to get your neighbours on side from the outset. 'Unlike regular extensions, basement projects can cause massive issues with neighbours – largely based on stories they might have heard about developments going wrong,' says William.

PLANNING PERMISSION

At one time, it was possible to create a basement extension under Permitted Development. These days, however, the chances of that happening are highly unlikely. 'A lot of authorities have clamped down,' says William. 'In some London boroughs, any subterranean development automatically requires formal consent. Or if you introduce a light well, for instance, that will necessitate planning permission because of the alteration to the exterior.' Consequently, it's essential to factor in the additional time and cost of planning into your project schedule. Find out more information at planningportal.co.uk.

HIRE A CONTRACTOR

'Some are better than others,' says William. 'It's very specialised work, so do your homework and make sure your contractor has relevant experience.'

MANAGE YOUR BUDGET

It's vital to keep a close eye on the pot of money you've allocated to your basement extension throughout the build. Plus, as you would with any extension scheme, it's a good idea to set aside a 10 per cent contingency fund in case any problems arise. Typically, you'll need £3,500-£4,000sq m for a fully-fitted basement.

iona and Tim Peregrine were delighted to find this Victorian property in 2010. It needed a lot of work, but with two young children to look after, they decided to wait. 'At this stage we had no plans for a basement room at all,' says Fiona.

CHANGING PLANS

Space-wise, the house was top heavy with five bedrooms split across the first and second floors, and a small living space on the ground floor. 'We needed more functional family space, but didn't want to disturb the lovely brick pattern on the back of the house with an extension,' says Fiona.

DIGGING DOWN

Instead, they began talks with Chris Scott at Mascot Bespoke Homes (mascotbespoke.com) about

the possibility of converting their 17sq m cellar into a big basement. 'We thought we might dig out under half of the house,' says Fiona. 'But we were advised that excavating under the whole house would be a better investment as we could also have a utility room, shower room and an extra bedroom.' In late 2014, plans were approved for a 99sq m basement level and excavation began by hand the following September. 'We needed to work carefully as we had to underpin the perimeter of the house in one-metre sections of steel reinforced concrete,' explains Chris.

COMPLETE WORKS

By June, the project was finished. 'Having a whole new floor was definitely the right investment – we use it daily and have a self-contained space for family visits.'

Boosting light

Clever glazing solutions, rooflights and sun pipes will fill your home with daylight and brighten dark corners

Natural light is one of the most desirable qualities an extension or conversion can have, but despite its ability to transform a space, it's often overlooked. Here's how to introduce more light into your new space.

LIGHT FROM ABOVE

Rooflights let far more light into the home than vertical windows. They're wonderfully versatile, too – available in both opening and fixed styles, they can be fitted on flat or pitched roofs, over kitchen islands or above staircases. Raised pyramid and lantern designs will allow daylight to flood the space while adding drama and height to the interior, and can even be fitted with remote control openings for ventilation.

If you live in a conservation area or listed building, specialised conservation rooflights and lanterns will bring plenty of daylight into your home.

Natural light is especially crucial for the success of any basement extension – if you're extending beyond the back wall of the property, look into installing a flat, walk-on rooflight.

OPEN UP

It goes without saying that if you fit a large expanse of glass like sliding or bifold doors, wrap-around corner glazing or even a full-height glass wall, you'll be rewarded with plenty of daylight. Glazing a gable end with fixed windows will introduce even more light and create a striking focal point, both internally and externally.

If you're looking for something really show-stopping, descending window systems (six-metre-wide walls of glass that disappear below the floor at the touch of a button, leaving a level threshold) will create an almost seamless link between your interior and exterior.

BORROWED LIGHT

A sun pipe – also known as a sun tunnel – is an easy and efficient way to brighten a space with little or no natural light. They work by capturing light at roof level, and diverting it down a reflective pipe to a ceiling diffuser. You can get rigid pipes for shorter distances and ingenious flexible tubes to bypass obstructions.

CLEAR WINNERS

Choosing glazed elements for internal walls and doors allows light to flow between rooms. Off-the-peg frameless glass doors in standard sizes make smaller spaces feel more open, while glass wall dividers allow you to partition a basement extension without sacrificing any light. Switchable privacy glass can be used for the walls of an en suite.



EXPERT ADVICE

Steve Bromberg, General Manager of Express Bi-Folding Doors, shares his tips for maximising light

■ WRAP AROUND CONFIGURATIONS

make the most of natural light and are perfect for extensions with more than one exterior wall facing the garden. Sliding doors can be placed at a right angle without needing a corner post, so the ceiling will look like it is floating.

■ PANORAMIC SLIDING DOORS are

architecturally designed to display minimal structure profiles, reducing the sightlines of aluminium frames dramatically.

■ BIFOLD DOORS

are the best option for flooding small spaces with light – especially in rooms of less than 4sq m.

■ ROOF LIGHTS AND LANTERNS

are simpler to install than a fully glazed structure or extension, so are a really cost effective way to bathe a room in light.

■ FLAT ROOFING is

becoming popular again. To give it a modern look, choose architecturally-led flat roof skylights for an aesthetically-pleasing, minimalist finish.







WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW WHEN...

Installing a garden room

If you've already extended or converted, or you're looking for extra space without much disruption, a garden studio can be a speedy, hassle-free alternative to a big build

As a flexible space that you can use as an office, gym, art studio or even as an annexe to your home, a room in the garden is often a convenient way of extending your home, provided you have the outside space to install one. Depending on its complexity, you can build your own or get a company to do all the hard work for you, making it a relatively straightforward project. We give you the lowdown on what to expect.

DO YOUR RESEARCH

First you need to find a design you like. There are plenty of options available, depending on the space you have and the style you prefer. Contemporary designs with bifolds or sliding doors allow the space to open directly out into the garden, like a summerhouse. Pod designs are convenient for smaller gardens and ideal if you don't need much internal space, perfect for a home office. If you prefer a more traditional design, shepherd's huts can squeeze in a bedroom, kitchen and even bathroom. If you do want a kitchen or bathroom, check that the company will incorporate them.

Most companies design and manage the build from start to finish, including organising approvals or permissions, but if you'd rather do the work yourself, companies like Building With Frames (building with frames.co.uk) sell kits from £7,020.


DISCUSS YOUR NEEDS

Once you have two or three designs you like, contact the companies, explaining what you want and how you'll be using the space. 'There are two statutory things that you need to iron out: Planning Permission and Building Regulations,' says Karl Stokes, MD of TG Escapes. 'You can build a garden room under Permitted Development (PD), but the building can't be over 2.5m in height. This can be restrictive, especially if

you're planning a gym or yoga studio as that only gives you about 2.1m internal height. Anything taller than 2.5m, or plans to use the space as an annexe, will require Planning Permission. The other restriction is Building Regulations approval. This applies within a metre of a boundary or if the building is over 30sqm in size.' Also, if you have specific plans for the decor and fittings, make these clear from the outset. Some companies will tweak their plans to accommodate these, others won't.

If you have the time, apply for Planning Permission to transform the space into an annexe at a later date. It may not apply to you but will prevent any issues if you decide to sell your house in the future.

'From inception to completion, the whole thing should take around 18 weeks. That's a couple of weeks to design it, taking into







account any special requirements,' says Karl. 'Then you need at least 10 weeks for Planning Permission if necessary, three to four weeks for construction off-site and another three to four weeks for the build.' Once you have chosen your preferred quote the company takes over.

INSTALLATION BEGINS

Once permissions and approvals (if any) have been sought, the build can begin. Garden rooms are usually constructed off-site and delivered to your home to be assembled. A site visit at quote stage will assess access to your garden.

'We've built lots of studios in central London, where access is very limited,' says Karl. 'Companies should be able to build the panels to size so whatever restrictions there may be, it shouldn't be too much trouble getting them into the back garden.'

Just before installation, the company will visit to prepare your garden and build the foundations. Any trees or plants that may affect the build will have to be relocated and if you're installing any pipework for water or sewerage, this will be done too. Once the site is ready, the building will arrive. First comes the pre-insulated shell, then plasterboard on top, followed by glazing and flooring. The build shouldn't take longer than a month and the room should be ready to use as soon as its done.

FINISHING TOUCHES

Depending on the upheaval that was required, your garden may need a little love once the builders have finished. Remember to budget for some landscaping to tidy up the garden after they've gone.

fter Bianca's father passed away in 2016, she began to think about how her mother, who lives in Northampton, could visit more often, yet still have her own space. 'I was also thinking of the future,' says Bianca. 'I wanted to create a place that she could eventually move into.'

GOING OUTSIDE

'We were lucky to have a 125m-long garden with a shed and treehouse at the bottom, which we could replace with a garden room. We picked TG Escapes (tgescapes.co. uk) to carry out the work as they allowed us to choose the exact decor and fittings that we wanted. We originally planned to create a one-bedroom property, but we decided an open-plan layout would give us more flexibility for now.'

SPEEDY WORK

After they received Planning Permission for the annexe with en suite, TG Escapes subcontracted Pine Tree Services (024 7627 7770; pinetree-services.co.uk) to clear the back of the garden and prepare for the plumbing. 'Andrew and Ian from TG then came in and built the whole thing in three weeks!' says Bianca. 'The studio arrived in three parts and was joined together on site, then they did the windows, flooring and plastering before installing fixtures and fittings.'

JOB DONE

While the idea began as a space for Bianca's mum, the whole family enjoys the room.'I use it as an office and the kids hang out there after school. Plus, the new decking is bathed in sunshine all afternoon, so it's our new entertaining spot!'

YOUR GUIDE TO...

Adding a loo

Squeeze an extra washroom into your extension, conversion or garden room for added versatility

Whether it's to ease the morning rush for the bathroom, prevent you having to traipse up flights of stairs, or simply for use when guests come to stay, an extra loo is always a useful addition. However, installing a new one can sometimes be less straightforward than replacing an existing one. Fortunately, there are a few options for making your new convenience more convenient.

PLAN YOUR PLUMBING

The ideal location for any additional loo is above or below an existing bathroom, so that it can connect to existing pipework and the soil and vent stack. However, if it's further away, one option is to add a new soil and vent stack either inside or outside your home, which works as long as there's a sewer that it can flow into.

If there's no immediate access or if the water needs to go uphill, such as in a basement installation, consider choosing a macerator pump or a loo that has its own macerator. 'Macerators enable the sewerage to be pumped through a small, thin flexible pipe,' says Robert Wood, founder of Simply Extend (simplyextend. co.uk). 'This means they can be installed without lifting case. that any connection to a drain owned by the local water authority may need without lifting existing floors. Remember that any connection to a drain owned

permission.' Macerators can move waste to your soil stack either vertically (a few metres) or horizontally (several metres). They'll be noisier than standard plumbing and can be prone to blockages from anything other than loo roll, but they do let you have a loo almost anywhere. Basic macerators start from £100, and ground floor cloakrooms from £3,000-£6,000.

GET PERMISSION

Adding a loo to your extension or conversion will rarely require Planning Permission unless your home is a listed building, but Building Regulations will apply to plumbing, drainage and ventilation.

However, adding a WC to a garden room will mean the project is more likely to need Planning Permission. Check with your local planning department.

BUDGET FOR THE GARDEN

Any new pipework should be buried in your garden or insulated, so it doesn't freeze. You may be able to link to an existing soil drain or septic tank. A sewage pumping station with a macerator can also be used to remove waste - but you'll need to add electricity to power this. Allow £2,000-£6,000 to add a loo to a garden room. A 'dry' eco toilet can be a more affordable option but requires maintenance.



EXPERT **ADVICE**

Ann Boardman, head of marketing and product development at Saniflo UK, explains how to add a macerator to your project

■ FOR CONVERSIONS AND EXTENSIONS

you'll need to check whether the existing drainage infrastructure is accessible for the new installation. Don't panic if it's not. A macerator can be installed with smallbore pipework to send the waste to a soil stack.

■ SELECT THE RIGHT MACERATOR

for your project. There are models for use with a single loo, a loo and basin or a full bathroom.

■ ENSURE THE MACERATOR CAN BE INSTALLED behind

your chosen loo (or behind a demountable panel if the unit needs to be obscured from sight).

■ NEXT, PLAN THE ROUTE for the smallbore pipework. It can run under floors, behind walls and in ceiling voids to join

■ FINALLY, ENSURE ADEQUATE ACCESS

existing drains.

to the unit for maintenance checks and make sure it's installed according to the manufacturer's guidelines.



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
