
Growing up, I was called an Indigo child. Only recently have I been correctly diagnosed with Borderline Personality



DESIGN

KNOW-HOW AND DECOR DETAILS THAT MAKE THE LOOK

















opiary – the art of clipping shrubs or trees into architectural shapes – is a form of gardening that will never go out of fashion. Nor is it a new fad. Gardeners have been doing it at least since Roman times, when the first written records appear in manuscripts by Pliny the Younger, who described box hedges cut into shapes and elaborate animal topiary at his Tuscan villa. It reached its heyday in seventeenthcentury Europe and is seen in its most ornate form at Louis XIV's Versailles, where mile upon mile of clipped hedges and elaborate box parterres make this one of the most high-maintenance gardens in the world.

The two most common plants to be topiarised are yew (*Taxus baccata*) and box (*Buxus sempervirens*). People often do not think beyond these evergreen stalwarts, but there are more trees and shrubs, both

evergreen and deciduous, that can be sculpted into shape. It is worth seeking out alternatives, particularly for box, which is being attacked from all sides by caterpillars and blight.

The characteristics of a good traditional topiary plant are smallish evergreen leaves and a bushy habit that can be clipped and cajoled into shape to provide year-round structure. Alternatives to box include the indigenous Searsia crenata, which has a compact habit and glossy dark-green leaves, pomegranate for an interesting option or Rhagoda histata for a silver leaf and full sun. Larger topiary forms can be created from a range of shrubs, including privet and both local Podocarpus *henkelii* and *P. falcatus*. Deciduous topiary is increasingly popular, with hornbeam and beech top of the list. They keep their


leaves for longer in winter than most deciduous trees, and the bare branches are intensely beautiful, too, especially when backlit by a low winter sun.

In terms of shape – let your imagination run away with you. From minimalist cubes to intricate curlicues, there is a place for some sort of topiary in every garden. In South Africa, local garden designers are exploring a more relaxed style of topiary influenced by naturalistic garden styles. Traditional parterres and formal spheres, obelisks and lollipops are being replaced by more organic forms: cloud-pruned hedges and loosely clipped trees sculpted into shapes inspired by nature and the landscape. So, instead of buying readyclipped evergreen balls next time, choose cheaper unclipped plants and start pruning them yourself into














more organic, irregular shapes. If you have an existing, unruly small tree or shrub, get your shears out and start gently shaping it, bit by bit, into a form that makes you smile. And, finally, be open to a bit of experimentation. Clip azaleas into cushions in the Japanese way, or *Plumbago auriculata* (Cape leadwort) into domes. And for a good lowmaintenance alternative, use a small-leaved hebe such as *H. pinguifolia* 'Sutherlandii', which keeps a tight shape with very little clipping.

BOX BLIGHT AND OTHER DISEASES

Box blight, *Cylindrocladium buxicola*, is a fungal disease affecting the leaves and stems of box plants. Symptoms include unsightly brown patches and die-back. It can spread quickly from plant to plant, especially in humid or wet conditions, so if you notice it, remove and destroy the plant and take immediate steps to avoid it spreading. Be especially careful when clipping, dipping shears

in a diluted bleach fluid to sterilise them between plants. Products such as fungicidal spray and a nutrient-rich natural tonic and fertilizer can help. The caterpillars of the box tree moth, *Cydalima perspectalis*, can be equally destructive. Native to East Asia, the moth is a relatively new alien import that is spreading swiftly. The moth lays its

eggs in white silky webbing within the bush; when the tiny green caterpillars emerge, they can defoliate a plant in days. The only solution is to be vigilant. Preempt matters by putting up sticky pheromone traps to get the moths before they get to your plants and check plants frequently for webs.

Top Five Topiary Plants

Podocarpus henkelii (Henkel's Yellowwood) Fantastic in every way, with tough, feathery foliage that delivers green pizzazz all year round. It clips well and looks best shaped into a compact pyramid shape or planted in a row and clipped as an architectural hedge. Laurus nobilis (Bay) Great for simple, larger-scale shapes, this is readily available and easy to grow. Quercus ilex (Holm Oak) Ideal for windy spots and even coastal gardens, as it is so tough. Clips and shapes really well. Ligustrum ovalifolium (Privet) Cheap and quick to grow, it has bright green foliage that clips well. Fully evergreen in milder gardens. Viburnum tinus 'Lucidum' (Laurustine) Fast growing, up to 60cm per year. Perfect for hedging in shaded areas with the added benefit of delicate heads of white flowers in winter, followed by dark blue-black fruit.

Small Wonder

Architects André Krige and Theo Kruger, the guys behind Uxolo apartments, talk micro-living, streamlined interiors and how they achieved Cape Town's most exciting new building

Architecturally, Uxolo appears to marry Ndebele patterning with a Memphis colour scheme. How did you develop this unexpectedly **synergetic visual language?** We stumbled upon the façade by a mix of happy accident and hard work. There was one telecom where the words 'a wonderful mix of Memphis meets Africa meets why the hell not?' came up – but figuring out the façade was no small task. We went through various patterns and layouts, some inspired by the fantastic The Ninevites rugs, others by Esther Mahlangu, all the while still not knowing what to expect as an end result. For the interior, we looked to the international apartment market. Some works by London-based 2LG Studio and Barcelona-based Colombo and Serboli Architecture come to mind. The location of the site and the challenges that came with the specific stand is what drove the final design decisions. Having a zero-metre building line on three sides of what is only a 160m² stand proved challenging. To get away with glazing on these façades we turned to glass bricks. The limitations of the face-brick is what simplified the design further. Working closely with Corobrik, we were able to source products not yet on the market, such as the beautiful mid-grey face-brick. As a result, we ended up with something that is quite fun. So yes, Ndebele meets Memphis is a great description.













INNOVATION



Micro-living requires a brilliant approach to space management – adaptive furniture, clever storage, multifunctional appliances and integrated finishes – to achieve a streamlined living experience. What was your approach to these 'capsule living' spaces?

We had good fun in the office thinking up the various types of occupants one could get in an inner-city micro apartment. We looked at different types of social and economic demographics. We looked at a variety of family types and sizes. The single bachelor/ette, the young professional couple, the Airbnb guest, the occasional break-away and then we started making a list of their needs. Everything that overlapped went in. That was hard, given we only had 24m² of space. Eventually we successfully fitted in: a bedroom, a lounge, a dining room, an en-suite bathroom and a kitchen complete with a stove, oven, fridge/freezer, dishwasher, washing machine and tumble dryer, all finished off with plenty of well hidden storage. We wanted it to look effortless, as if there was nothing in there at all, so all the components were brought onto a single wall, effectively making one unit that does everything. We looked at clever concepts, such as wall beds that double as a sofa, that then double as trunk storage.





When it comes to the modern garden: no rules are the new rules, according to Franchesca Watson – so go wild

Last year was a rather long and frustratingly unpredictable one – political and economic challenges seemed to dog the entire world, all so serious. As a respite, our gardens and green spaces should be relaxing, and this year I intend to have a lot more general, everyday fun with the outdoors.

As such, I want plant combinations that make me smile. Seriousness and correctness are not on the agenda, instead I'm going to create a crazy, fun atmosphere in my green space – and laugh a lot more.

Maybe I harbour an inner hippy or 90s rock star but I'm going to indulge myself and respond instinctively to the shape and colour of plants. I'm going bold with everything and will aim to be brazenly light hearted.

I will be mixing it up: marigolds with grasses, roses and palms, cannas behind my salvias. In fact, all those plants that 'good taste' has been avoiding for years seem now to be the ones with personality: begonias, flax, mirror bush, petunias, dahlias, hibiscus. Clashing colour and intriguing texture are

paramount. Form plants really are big news: cordylines, agaves, euphorbias, tetrapanax, just about any succulent (the odder the better).

I'm going to festoon my pergola with orange *Pyrostegia venusta* clashing with a blue *Petrea*, plant Italian fan palms (*Chamaerops humilis*) with ground-cover roses, and mix irises with cotyledons – and plenty of wobbly, otherworldly clipped shapes.

I'm going to throw some local plants into the mix, but not unless they are stand-alone and fabulous: *Leonotis*, low aloes, lovely, bunching grasses, almost every bulb that occurs – especially *Crinums* and swathes of *Nerines* in vibrating colours.

I'm going to relax, forget all the rules and follow the crazy – there's something gobsmackingly glamorous about funkiness.



MAINTAINENCE

Daily: Wooden floors require daily care, as any build-up of dirt and grit may lead to damage and the necessity of sanding and re-sealing the floors sooner than anticipated. Be aware of factors that cause scratches, keep the planks clean and use wax sparingly to rejuvenate the wood.

Long run: If the floor needs to be re-finished due to damage or wear, all the old varnish and sealer should be removed by sanding with an industrial floor sander (best done by a professional to avoid unnecessary damage). Clean the floor afterwards with mineral turpentine and seal with Woodoc's Water-Borne Floor Sealer, which dries quickly - and hard and is virtually odourless.

Re-Wild

'For too long we've viewed wilderness as a place outside of our cities' boundaries,' says gardener Athol McLaggan. 'This project shows that we can create diversity in our urban gardens.' Use these simple tips and ideas to bring nature back into your own home and neighbourhood.

Create wildlife-friendly natural pockets on verges with plants that attract bees, butterflies and pollinators. Minimise lawns by incorporating beds of succulents, grasses and flowering perennials to add structure and variety and bring in the birds and bees. Mow the lawn you have less often - every two or three weeks - to encourage butterflies and other wildlife. Lay off

the chemicals and fertilisers: they only end up in your drinking water. Your excitement about a spotted eagle owl in the garden can be contagious, at the water cooler or via social media.

The accepted rule of feeding birds is that first prize is to provide natural food sources by planting a smart plant palette. Alternatively, feed appropriate foods only intermittently to prevent dependency.

ccording to a recent study led by the University of Exeter, people living in neighbourhoods with more birds, shrubs and trees are less likely to suffer from depression, anxiety and stress. Watching birds and having access to pockets of nature near our homes is good for our health, say the experts. Enter the team of horticulturalists, botanists and birding fundis spearheading the latest wetland project at the Arderne Gardens in Claremont, and they couldn't agree more.

It's hard to imagine that 200 years ago all the land eastwards of the Claremont railway line was lowland fynbos with seasonal wetlands - now covered by suburbia. 'All we have left of this precious habitat is the Rondebosch Common and a single small reserve in the Kenilworth Racecourse,' says project co-ordinator and landscape architect Hank Lith. The idea behind the project is that the wetland will contribute in a small way to the public understanding of the past natural environment and, most importantly, bring back the fast-disappearing local









birds and amphibians, such as the endangered Western leopard toad. The project is unique as it mimics the wetland ecosystem that occurred hundreds of years ago in the greater Claremont area: a severely threatened endemic Cape lowlands habitat,' say archeological botanist, Elzanne Singels and conservation ecologist, Alex Landsdowne, who together lead the wetland planting plan. The group's focus is on reinstating species that historically thrived in the area, incorporating extinct and threatened plants such as the Whorled Heath (Erica verticillate) and Pearl Heath (*E. margaritacea*).

'The project was motivated by a dry clay landscape that was the garden's lush lower pond before the drought hit Cape Town,' says arborist and chairman Francois Krige. The wetland now complements the historical arboretum by adding a new layer of biodiversity heritage – and transforms this area of the garden into a beautiful and ecologically verdant focal point that already attracts birds and wildlife that have long been absent. It's living proof that our cities are healthier and happier when the neighbours aren't only of the two-legged, human variety.

Getting to grips with wetlands

Water world

A wetland is a distinct ecosystem inundated by water either permanently, or seasonally - as is the case at Arderne Gardens. The primary factor that distinguishes wetlands from other land forms or water bodies is the characteristic vegetation of aquatic plants, adapted to the uniquely boggy, hydric soil.

Safe haven

Wetlands are a critical part of our natural environment. They reduce the impacts of floods, absorb pollutants, and improve water quality. Wetlands provide a unique habitat for a multitude of animals, birds and plants and contain diverse life, supporting specialised plants and wildlife found nowhere else.



Unique wetland plants seen at Arderne Gardens are the endangered Bloukalossie iris (*Ixia monodelph*) whose habitat is restricted to the low-lying, wetland habitats of the Cape, and the endemic *Watsonia tabularis* with flame-coloured, sunbird-enticing flowers – a spectacular sight at Arderne in spring.

Architect's Notebook

KAREN NEWMAN SHARES HER THOUGHTS ON...

#ORIENTATION:A House For All Seasons

Orienting a house on its stand is the first thing an architect discusses with a client. The word "orientation" is derived from Latin, meaning "the rising of the sun", hence in architecture, the positioning of a building in relation to seasonal variations in the sun's path

SUN AND SEASONS

- This is a universal design truth: ideally place your house to face north when living below the equator (and south when living above).
- In South Africa, a north-facing house opening out onto a sunny garden with distant views to the north is well on its way to orientation Nirvana. This situation invites the sun in where you need it most, and turns away from it when it's hot, to minimise solar gain. With heating and cooling prices as well as our environmental impact awareness rising, one can limit costs with the correct orientation of a house.

SOME TIPS TO ENSURE GOOD BUILDING ORIENTATION

- North-facing rooms are warm in winter and cool in summer, benefitting from long winter rays when the sun is lower in the sky in winter, yet shelter from the sun when it's directly overhead in summer. [1]
- Place your main living areas to the north and keep garages, entrances and utilities to the south.[2] Ideally place your driveway, front door and garages on the less desirable south side of the house.
- Position your house as far south on the stand as possible to enjoy maximum north-facing garden space. Play areas, pools and lawns are best placed on the warm side of the house.
- Court morning sunlight: position

your kitchen and breakfast room on the


In winter, a westerly 'sun room' can be glorious. [3] However, in summer, this same afternoon sun can overheat a house. To avoid this consider adding verandahs, using deep roof overhangs, installing shutters, or greening a pergola with summer climbers that cast shade.

WIND AND WEATHER

- The general rule is to turn your back to the wind. Main living areas should face away from prevailing summer winds. [4]
- In windy areas, create a courtyard so you can still open your house to a sheltered garden space. [5]

VIEWS AND VISTAS

- If your views are to the north, you've struck gold: you can enjoy both the sun and the views on the same side.
- A west- or east-facing view poses some challenges with too much angled sun. A deep verandah or shady pergolas can ease the pain, especially on hot summer afternoons.
- One big advantage of a south-facing view is that you can enjoy expansive windows (however, consider double-glazing to limit that icy feeling from too much glass). Plan your house to open out to the north, where you'll find yourself on cooler days and throughout winter. ■

A Parisian design team turn back the clock on an office block, breaking conventions to create an enchanting wonderland for whimsical family living

mong the many quotes by French poet Paul Valéry that adorn the buildings of the Palais de Chaillot, there is this one in particular that resonates with the homeowners of a restored building – a former office block turned family residence – a stone's throw from the famous structures: 'It depends on the one who passes, if I am tomb or treasure, whether I speak or keep silent, this is up to you, a friend does not enter without desire.' In those few transcendent lines, scribed decades before the present, Valéry has captured the spirit of modern living, of reinvention and rebirth, of risk and reward and the cohesion of designer and architect. After all, anyone who's ever embarked on an epic renovation knows how quickly a treasured home can turn into a tomb of troubles.

When GCG Architects's Alexandre Goulet, Noémie Tissier and Jérôme Jacqmin (the homeowner had discovered the Paris-based firm in the pages of a decor magazine) first stepped into the 16th arrondissement building it had all the charm and panache of a run-down office space left to decay – but it matched its sorry state with undeniable potential. Playing out across five levels and a roof that would eventually become the terrace, there was a sense of character to the space just waiting to be revealed, and it was done so with a colour-fuelled dose of Kahloesque fantasy and flair. 'Our mandate was clear: we had to restore the character of the home,' recalls Noémie.

This process was initiated by removing the plaster that was covering the original brick façades, extending four window areas into large bay windows, replacing





the impersonal concrete balconies with graceful black metal ones and reorienting the original staircase (and replacing it with one of raw oak and lacquered steel railings). The sloping roof was also opened up, creating a charming roof terrace. The floor plan was completely revised, too, with private and public areas designated across the different levels to encourage shared and intimate moments that the blueprint lacked before.

'We wanted to create an enchanted universe to meet the needs of a truly international family,' says Noémie of the interiors. 'There is mix of style and spontaneity as the homeowner drew on her extensive travels, from Manish Arora,

Patricia Urquiola and India Mahdavi to her visits to India and Morocco.' Nowhere is this more apparent than the grand custom mosaic, playfully called Flight of the Bumblebee, that riffs on the Rimsky-Korsakov melody. What Noémie and the team at GCG Architects have achieved through the rampant gaiety of tone and texture is a triumph of decorative joie de vivre where each level offers a surprising new twist, from the eclectic assembly of furniture pieces to the alchemic treatment of texture and tone. This then is as much a science of style as it is poetry for the eyes, a true family treasure. And we're pretty sure Paul Valéry would agree with that. ■





















fear of heights is not what you would expect from the owner of a penthouse on the thirteenth floor of a block of apartments. But it was one of the defining factors for this King's Cross roof terrace owned by Alex Hooi and Keir McGuinness and designed

by Emily Erlam in 2014 'Keir was upfront about the fact he disliked heights, so we had to find a solution that disguised the edges of the terrace and provided a barrier to the sheer drop below,' says Emily. The dizzying vertical views have been cushioned by clever planting, lulling people into forgetting how high they are – yet still allowing a dramatic and far-reaching panorama of the city.

'Our objective was to create some sort of seclusion and enclosure in what was a windy, barren space,' says Keir, who bought the apartment in the RIBA award-winning Plimsoll Building in 2014. 'When you are out on the terrace at weekends, this place is so quiet. There's a real sense of peace and calm.'

Spanning 170 square metres, this is certainly one of the largest private roof spaces in this area, if not the whole of London, so the aim was to divide up the space into a series of cocooned seating and dining areas to make it feel less bleak. 'It was a challenge,' remembers Emily. 'I was collaborating with David Morley Architects and interior designers Johnson Naylor while the building work was still in progress to ensure that the roof terrace was integrated seamlessly into the design, attending board meetings with huge numbers of people.'

Then there were the infinitesimal calculations for weight allowance. This is, of course, of paramount importance on a roof, as are the considerations that go hand-in-hand with it. The Kinley planters, for example,

made from 3mm thick powder-coated steel, are without bases and filled with lightweight compost to half their depth only. They also had to fit the space down to the last millimetre, a plan that almost went pear-shaped when, well into the design process, Emily was informed that various points around the perimeter of the terrace had to be kept free for abseiling access for window cleaners. The solution? To design bespoke containers that can be wheeled out.

The other challenge of any roof terrace, particularly one this high, is that it has its own microclimate. 'Wind speeds can be extraordinarily high up here and can pick up quickly, so we had to be aware of that at all times and never leave anything untethered,' says Emily. The planting is designed to withstand the inhospitable, desiccating conditions with as little intervention as possible.

Emily's bible became *The Dry Gardening Handbook* by Olivier Filippi, who runs a nursery in France that specialises in Mediterranean plants. She chose sculptural, moundforming plants that can withstand sun and wind, such as escallonia and euonymus, as well a billowing evergreen shrubs like *Pinus sylvestris* 'Watereri', *Pinus mugo* and *Phillyrea angustifolia* to create the required screening. Aromatic rosemary, oregano and lavender cascade around a wide cedar day bed with built-in storage, while softer plants such as pennisetum and gaura bring contrast and movement.

Movement also comes from the bronze water feature, inspired by something Keir had seen at the RHS Chelsea Flower Show. 'The movement and gentle sound of the water is designed to focus you inwards on the space, so you're distracted from the world outside,' says Emily. It has brought an unexpected bonus. 'We get all sorts of wildlife,' says Keir. 'We've had ducks nesting, goldfinches and even dragonflies. It's wonderful'.

espite its proximity
to the ocean and
laid-back coastal
location, this
Zimbali home
wasn't ever destined
to conform to

typical beach house criteria. The owners – a young family – recently relocated to KwaZulu-Natal from Johannesburg but weren't moving to a holiday home, so the space needed to reflect the transition from city to coast but also the house's permanent status via the design.

With this need to steer clear of stereotypes in mind, design firm Fyfe Boyce took on board the clients' brief, which offered some guidelines, but also allowed the firm to interpret its vision fairly freely. 'They knew that they had a special home in terms of architecture and location, and they wanted us to help them realise its potential. Their overriding desire was for a sophisticated space with room to move around freely in,' elaborates Kelsey Boyce.

Beyond that the direction was quite open. So, cued by the clients themselves and their affinity for city life, as well as their love

of the bush, Fyfe Boyce set out to create a space that merged these passions, with an ocean backdrop. 'Their connection to the city is a strong one and although they've made Durban their home, they didn't want to lose the urban energy they'd become so accustomed to,' explains Kelsey. 'We had to avoid the obvious temptation of designing a traditionally coastal interior that would have been beautiful but wouldn't have aligned with who they are,' he explains. So rather than defaulting to seaside clichés, the designers created a scheme sympathetic to the clients' personalities.





'Our thinking kept returning to a combination we'd never seen in one space before – an urban game lodge by the ocean. We're sure nothing like that exists but if it does, this is how we think it would look,' explains Bruce Fyfe. This trifecta of styles city penthouse, bush lodge, beach escape while theoretically incongruous, works by virtue of common links and contrasting elements that complement one another. The organic natural textures emblematic of the bush and beach are countered by a graphic geometric undertone that smartens up the scheme. The result is

a slickness not usually seen in a beachhouse setting, which is underpinned by a predominantly dark envelope.

Completely counter to the classic breezy aesthetic one expects from coastal living, this surprising palette is peppered with an occasional dose of striking colour. 'Interestingly enough the owners initially wanted the home to be "bright and light" but when we presented a few initial images they felt they were too safe and neutral,' adds Bruce. This reaction spurred on a much punchier approach that saw the team toning down the airiness in a major

way with dark wood panelling, flooring and furniture in the living spaces, which also serve as a retreat from the heat and humidity of the KZN climate. 'The home's architecture puts it slightly on the dark side as it is, and we didn't want to fight that so instead decided to accentuate it,' comments Kelsey.

Along with strong colour, the owners wanted an unfussy interior. So rather than overfilling the spaces, the designers took the approach of creating impact through fewer but more powerful pieces and depth through a carefully considered approach


to texture. A natural and tactile base of leather, timber, sisal and stone is lifted with metallic accents to represent the urban/ earthy hybrid. 'Our focus was on big, bold pieces that would occupy the vast spaces without overpowering them,' he says. Lowslung sofas inside were designed to keep the horizon intact and large pieces were only positioned against internal walls, and never against glass.

This uncluttered aesthetic is extended into the outdoors with slightly tougher materials to combat the elements – cowhide rugs, granite and hard-wearing outdoor


fabrics translate the look in a more durable way. 'We couldn't adopt a traditional approach to outdoor furniture - it needed to be hardy to survive the coastal elements but also look soft enough to coexist with the interior,' explains Bruce.

The easy transition from indoors to out is emblematic of the whole and the clever merging of style and place, which has produced a coastal house that defies convention – a cocoon of sophisticated but earthy textures that acknowledges the ocean setting without making it the central focus. • Fyfe Boyce of fyfeboyce.co.za














one are the days when the exterior of a building gave a pretty good heads up about what lay within. Enter Electric Island. On the outside, white and polite, on the inside... Well, it's far from that. Remember kaleidoscopes? Those deceptively simple kids' toys that revealed a gyration of patterns and geometries by simply looking through a pinhole in a cardboard tube? That's how Neil describes this interior, and he's pretty spot on. That it's a fresh visual dimension at every turn works well because it's an abode

that was curated to work as a super cool urban pied-à-terre, an Airbnb experience, a function venue, and pop-up private club. How, you may ask? Surely one experience is compromised for others in appealing to all functions? Not if you think about modern urban living, in which all that's really asked of the places we check into is their ability to host their inhabitants in an exciting, inspiring way. 



































was looking for an old finca,' recalls Dutch businessman Emile Kuenen, referencing the vernacular farmhouses that are unique to Ibiza – a local architecture of white blocks that had evolved over millennia, growing as families grew and added to them, higgledy-piggledy, block by block. 'They are unbelievably charming,' he explains.

Emile first visited Ibiza for his brother's wedding. 'I thought it was only clubs,' he says. What he encountered, however, was 'completely different' – a largely undisturbed Mediterranean island. 'Ninetyfive per cent is fantastic nature,' he says. 'I fell in love with it.' He immediately wanted a place there he could call his own but he soon found he would have to be patient in his search. It took a few years before he found his place on the island. Fincas are traditionally made with small doors and windows to keep their interiors cool in the Mediterranean heat. 'I like big rooms, I like a lot of light,' says Emile.

Eventually, his patience was rewarded when he found the perfect compromise: a piece of undisturbed inland forest complete with a plan for a house by one of the island's most sought-after architects, Rolf Blakstad. Rolf's practice, Blakstad, has evolved the vernacular of the island's architecture for our times. 'We have not changed the designs much except in opening up the houses more and introduced the use of glass,' he says. 'In that sense, they're totally suited to the climate.' Using more glass also allows him to engage with the interior-exterior living that is particularly the case with summer houses.

'We decided to build it,' says Emile, in short. The result is a modern finca that treats the immediate exterior spaces as if they are part of the house. The aesthetic tends towards the minimal, rather than the ornate Moroccan-influenced styles of some Ibizan architecture. We really concentrate on trying to leave a very neutral base for the people who will be living in the house to develop their own taste,' says Rolf.

Emile had met South African interior designer Sumari Krige, founder of La Grange Interiors, while he was on holiday in Cape Town. Driving past her showroom, he stopped and went inside. By chance, Sumari was there, and he asked her to





start working on the interiors for his Ibizan summer house. 'There was a rawness that appealed to him,' Sumari says of Emile's response to what he'd seen at La Grange Interiors, which seemed perfect for his setting.

Sumari took her cue from the subtle restraint, repetition and variation of Rolf's palette of architectural materials. 'If you look at it, there's only two or three materials – wood, stone and plastering – so we layered on that, and softened it with fabric,' she says. 'The furniture is only there to complement what the architect did.'

Emile was looking for a practical, understated, lived-in kind of luxury. 'Comfort was of the essence,' says Sumari. After all, the home is meant to be a retreat, an escape from manic city living. 'It's not precious,' she says. But, for a bit of dramatic contrast, she's introduced the occasional touch of pure luxury. In the master bedroom, for example, there's a single velvet chair. 'All the outdoor furniture is in solid teak,' says Sumari. 'It really ages beautifully.' Left untreated, it turns a silvery colour, which brings a gently worn and rooted sensibility to the house.

Sumari steered clear of pristine white, opting instead for 'tones of beige, mauve, grey'. She drew these earthy colours from the brick, wood and stone. 'The floors are amazing,' she says. They're paved with local slate and a creamy cement unique to the region. 'There's grit in the cement, almost like terrazzo.' She also took inspiration from the sun-drenched colours of the island, adding accents of mustard, olive and aquamarine. Graphic patterns were layered onto the neutral base with scatters and carpets. In addition, Sumari favoured weaves and textures with inherent patterns. 'In a big area, they look plain, but they've actually got detail,' she points out.

The result looks like it has been there for years. 'Everything is made to be lived with,' says Emile. 'The thought of going to that house, it makes you feel like you're totally away from everything.' • La Grange Interiors dagrangeinteriors.co.za

RUSSIAN OLIVIER SALAD WITH MARINATED SEAFOOD

SERVES 8

For the potato salad dressing

125ml mayonnaise (recipe below)
1T white-wine vinegar
11/2t Dijon mustard
1T water, to loosen the dressing
1/4t black pepper

For the mayonnaise

2 free-range egg yolks
15g Dijon mustard
30ml white-wine vinegar
500ml canola oil
juice of 1 lemon
salt and freshly ground pepper

For the potato salad

4 medium waxy potatoes (such as red potatoes), boiled, cooled 6 eggs, hard-boiled

4 pickled herring, diced 4 dill pickles (not sweet) 3 to 4 green onions 1/2 medium apple 1T fresh dill 1T fresh parsley salt, to taste

For the marinated seafood

1 cup white wine
1T black peppercorns
2 garlic cloves
1 bay leaf
1L water
juice of 1 lemon
600g mixed seafood (such
as calamari tubes, octopus
and mussels)
1 cup olive oil
juice of 1/2 orange
juice of 1/2 lemon and zest of
1 lemon
salt and ground pepper
chopped parsley

chopped dill

whisk the egg yolks, mustard and vinegar until pale. Add the oil in a slow and steady stream so the yolk mixture emulsifies the oil. Continue until the oil is incorporated. Season to taste with salt, pepper and lemon juice. Keep refrigerated until ready to be used. 2. For the dressing, mix all the ingredients in a small bowl with a whisk until well blended. Add water for desired consistency. **3.** For the potato salad, cook eggs and unpeeled potatoes, then cool. Peel both and set aside. 4. Dice all ingredients into 1.3cm cubes and mix gently in a large bowl, add herbs and dressing last, then season with salt to taste. Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes to allow flavours to meld. Do not be tempted to skip this step as it makes a difference. 5. For the seafood, place white wine, peppercorns, garlic cloves, bay leaves, water and lemon juice in a large pot. Bring to a boil then lower the temperature to a simmer. 6. Add the octopus and let simmer for 45 minutes, or until tender. Remove from the heat and let the octopus cool in the liquid; this can be done 2 days in advance. Remove the octopus from the liquid, cover and refrigerate. 7. Using half of the same liquid, steam the mussels, strain and remove from shells, cover and refrigerate. Cook the calamari in the other half of the same liquid for 3 minutes, and then let it cool in the liquid. Remove the calamari, cover and refrigerate. 8. Remove the soft purple skin and suckers from the octopus. Marinate it for I hour in extra-virgin olive oil, chopped garlic and parsley. 9. Mix the seafood, olive oil, chopped parsley and dill, orange juice, lemon juice

1. To make the mayonnaise,

marinate for at least 12 hours before serving. Add salt, pepper and more olive oil to taste. The seafood may then be served with the potato salad by arranging it carefully on top of each serving. Top with a boiled quail egg as garnish and fresh dill.

MACADAMIA AND LEMON DUKKAH ROAST CHICKEN

SERVES 4

1 cup macadamia nuts
1 cup chopped almonds
1 cup sesame seeds
1 cup coriander seeds
1 cup cumin seeds
4T lemon zest
1t salt
1t coarse black pepper
1,2kg whole chicken

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°C.
- 2. Toast nuts for 10 minutes.
- **3.** Toast sesame, cumin and coriander seeds in a pan over medium heat until fragrant.
- **4.** Cool down nuts and seeds.
- 5. Place in a blender and blitz until coarse. Add salt and pepper. 6. To make the chicken, preheat oven to 180°C. Tie the wings and legs of the chicken with butcher string, cover the tips of the wings and legs with foil so they do not burn (remove foil 10 minutes before end of roasting time). **7.** Drizzle chicken with olive oil, rub with dukkah spice and place on a roasting tray (if you would like to use it as a stuffing under the skin of the breasts, mix 2T soft butter with 1/2 cup dukkah and press into the cavity between the skin and breast). 8. Place in oven for 20 minutes, then reduce heat to 160°C, and roast for an hour. Remove from oven and rest for 10 minutes before carving •

1. Heat the olive oil in a large, lidded frying pan. Add the onions and peppers and season with salt and pepper. Cook on a medium heat until just softened. Add the garlic and cook for a further 2 minutes. Sprinkle in the cumin and caraway seeds and the spices. Stir in the tomato paste and cook for a few more minutes until the paste starts to separate. Add the whole peeled tomatoes, sun-dried tomatoes, plum tomatoes and aubergine with a splash of water. 2. Simmer for 10 minutes, uncovered,



until reduced a little. Taste after 5 minutes and add a little sugar if you think the tomatoes need it. Keep an eye on the texture – you don't want it runny, but it mustn't get too dry either. Add a little more water if necessary. When the sauce is reduced, stir in the herbs. 3. Make eight small wells in the sauce. Break an egg into a cup and drop it carefully into a well. Repeat with the remaining eggs. Cook for a few more minutes until the whites are just set and the yolks are still runny. Sprinkle over the crumbled feta. Top with sliced chorizo, vine tomatoes and serve with

SHARLOTKA – RUSSIAN APPLE CAKE

SERVES 8 TO 12

8 medium Granny Smith apples, peeled and sliced in quarters

6 eggs
420g sugar
300g cake flour
1t bicarbonate of soda
1t baking powder
1g ground nutmeg
4g ground cinnamon
5ml vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 160°C.
 Prepare bundt cake form by spraying with nonstick cooking spray and set aside.
 Whip eggs and sugar

until light and thick, then add vanilla extract. It should form a ribbon when dropping down from the whisk. 3. Sift all dry ingredients and fold into egg mixture in three stages. 4. Add the apple quarters. 5. Pour into cake form and bake for about 30 minutes or until a cake testing skewer comes out clean when inserted into the cake. **6.** To serve, caramelize some apple slices with sugar and butter, place on cooled cake and drizzle with remaining caramel syrup from pan and top with crème fraîche if you like. ■

Hold Your Own

This month's object of desire the EXTRAORDINARY CERAMIC POT





ots represent prosperity, the female realm of nurture, fecundity, holding and abundance – particularly round-bellied pots. In a word, they mean plenty. Who could resist? My current favourite, because of its perfect form and proportion and the modernist pattern and colouring, is by ceramicist Ian Garrett. The technique he uses made the sense of the piece more meaningful and personal: he explains, 'My pots are inspired by my interest in archaeology ancient traditions of pottery found around the world that continue here in Africa. They're handmade, without a potter's wheel. The form is just built up with coils of clay squeezed and smoothed into place by eye. Then, I draw little fine lines on the surface by pressing into the semi-dry clay with the edge of a white mussel shell. The colours are all-natural clay and earth pigments, and the shine comes from burnishing the clay with a smooth stone. There's no glaze, just clay textures.' iangarrettceramics@gmail. com
